From our Parish Nurse...

Dear Family and Friends,

As we begin the summer, our thoughts drift to lazy and quiet days of childhood. June is recognized as National Safety month.

I want to take this time to share some thoughts on children and Violence. The average person gets angry 10-14 times per day. We thank God; we have options besides action on this powerful emotion. God calls us to live lives exemplified by being "... not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome" (1 Tim. 3:3).

Why is Violence a Concern for our children?

Recently, several young people have been shot or have shot or stabbed parents and siblings. The country and the church have been shocked and asked: what do we have to do to protect our children from such violence? Indeed, the climate of escalating violence in our country needs our attention and prayers. There does not seem to be a single cause for youth violence, but three primary factors cited frequently are, violent images readily available on TV and movies, the Internet and video games, and the availability of both drugs and guns. In addition, the number of young people in need of professional mental health care has doubled since the 1970's. All this together adds up to a higher potential for violence.

How can the church be a safe place for children and adolescents?

Communities and schools, churches and other organizations have begun to fight back and offer conflict management programs. This is clearly an area where we all need to work together especially from the perspective of our faith. Jesus is our Savior, brother, and role model for non-violence!

Among some things we can do to disable violence are:

- Pray for wisdom and pray for our children
- Model non-violence at home, work and play
- Monitor how our children play and what media influences they are exposed to and how they are affected
- Teach children anger and conflict management approaches and encourage schools, churches and other organizations to also offer these programs
- Support parents, schools and churches in efforts to protect children from violence and teach other conflict management techniques
- Serve in areas of social justice. If you want peace, work for justice
- Trust that violence is not unavoidable and convey this to our children

"No longer will violence be heard in your land, nor ruin or destruction within your borders, but you will call your walls salvation and your gates praise" (Is. 60:18). Please see me if we can work together.

A Recipe for you...

Some of the ladies from church have been begging me for a recipe, so I thought I would just have it published in the Visitor. Here it is:

Skier's French Toast

2 Tablespoons Corn Syrup
1/2 c. Butter (1 stick)
1 c. Brown Sugar

1 loaf of Homemade Bread (I use the Texas Toast Bread or slice up the homemade bread thickly)

5 Eggs
1 1/2 c. Milk
1 to 1 1/2 Teaspoon Vanilla
1/4 Teaspoon Salt

Cinnamon

Directions:

Melt corn syrup, butter and brown sugar in a saucepan until it is a syrup consistency. Pour the mixture into a 9x13 baking pan to form a thin layer. Set pan aside.

Take the loaf of bread and cut off crusts from all edges. Form two layers of bread slices in the 9x13 pan on top of the syrup mixture.

Mix the eggs, milk, vanilla and salt together with a whisk or fork. Pour the egg mixture over the bread layers making sure to coat the bread evenly. Sprinkle with cinnamon if you desire.

Cover the casserole and put in the refrigerator overnight. In the morning, leave the casserole out on the counter while the oven preheats to 350 degrees. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes or until golden brown on the top. Serve immediately with syrup and butter.

Today's average seminarian pays approximately \$20,000 per year for seminary. This includes tuition, books, room and board, and other miscellaneous costs.

Today's average seminarian leaves seminary with \$18,000 in student loans.

The starting pay for today's average seminary graduate is \$21,000 plus housing.

In order to help defray seminary costs at the request of our Synod and the larger Church, we at St. James have committed \$3,000 per year to Katie and Mike. It is our hope that we will be able to raise this money through special giving, so as not to reduce other areas of ministry vital to the congregation and the Synod. Thus far, we are no where near meeting our goal and are looking at the possibility of "robbing Peter to pay Paul" come August.

Let's not be one of those congregations that neglects our seminarian. Let's not be one of those congregations that are the talk of Pastor's

Conferences, and yes – we do talk about those congregations.

Starting today, and for the next 3 weeks we are going to push our Seminary Appeal, so that we can enter into summer knowing that our fall obligations are taken care of. Please prayerfully consider how much you are able to support our seminarian, and then tithe 10% more than that. That shows a commitment to Christ's Church, and a real trust of the promises of God.
